ACSA-QLD - A New Chapter is Born

On Tuesday the 19th of June, 18 very keen Queenslanders met to discuss the formation of an ACSA-QLD Chapter. Hosted by Inspiring Australia and located at the Queensland Museum in Brisbane, the discussion ranged from how many Queensland citizen science projects were currently underway; how to collaborate together so as to stop the duplication of projects (e.g. one big Qld Koala Count vs lots of small ones) and the use of social media for engagement in citizen science in Queensland. Communication and sharing data and resources were the take home messages of the day.

After some discussion it was decided that James Gullison (Griffith Uni, Gold Coast) would be the new Chair with Nikki Sims-Chilton (Office of the Qld Chief Scientist) as the Vice-Chair. Any other positions may be decided on at future meetings and everyone is welcome to put their hand up for the committee if they are an ACSA member. Non-members are always welcome to be a part of the Qld Chapter. As Queensland is so large future meetings may be held online.

The Office of the Chief Scientist of Queensland offered to host future meetings. The paperwork is currently being reviewed by the 48 prospective Qld Chapter members from all over Queensland who expressed an interest in becoming involved, many of whom could not make it on the day.
