Chatting to Martin Brocklehurst

In late August ACSA Chair Erin Roger along with ACSA member Patrick Tegart met with Martin Brocklehurst. Martin is one of the founders of the European Citizen Science Association (ECSA) & Coordinator of the citizen science delegation to the UN World Data Forum in Dubai October 2018.

They discussed Martin's progress with the Global Mosquito Alert Consortium and his work to raise the profile of citizen science for the European Union. Erin shared some of the recent Australian successes, such as the recently announced ACSA SEED grants and the recent Eureka Prize night.



Earlier this month, members of the newly formed ACSA-QLD also met with Martin Brocklehurst. They were invited to participate in a round table discussion with Martin, ACSA member Libby Hepburn (Atlas of Life) and members of industry and business. After Donnell Davis,, Martin gave a short presentation entitled #1BillionCitSci2020 in which he spoke about the formation of ECSA and how they have been starting to harmonise the projects in Europe, as well as talk to local, state and federal politicians particularly about health issues (e.g. mosquitoes, air quality) and the environment including plastic pollution and threatened species.
