In response to the bushfire crisis, ACSA is seeking to support conversations and plans – both short and long term - that help further connect the citizen science community to contribute to the complex efforts required to learn from and understand the impact of the bushfires (see <u>ACSA bushfire response</u>).

The first step we are taking is an audit to gather as many research projects as we can that include fire – bushfire/forest/wildfire as their focus and citizen science as part of their methodologies. We have developed the <u>ACSA Citizen</u> <u>Science Bushfire Response Project survey</u> and we would be very grateful if you could circulate this widely through your networks to all those who might already be working in this area. We are seeking projects across a broad spectrum of subjects, from biodiversity to human health that use a wide range of methodologies, from projects which require on the ground work, to purely online projects where everyone can contribute.

This information will be used to create a publicly available list of active projects and ACSA will work with partners to identify a number of projects that have the potential to contribute on a national scale.

Late last year, the Atlas of Living Australia (ALA) released its <u>Future</u> <u>Directions National Consultation - Findings Report</u>. This report was changing national and international policy landscape. Designed to capture and synthesise stakeholder insights and needs, the ALA can now identify Australia's interests for, and expectations from, national biodiversity data infrastructure.
