Speaking of which, the ACSA management committee and Chapter Chairs met in Canberra for two days late last month. We did pretty well in achieving our objectives: getting to know one another (particularly important with six new members and two years of Covid lockdowns), getting to know ACSA and where it is headed, and setting our actions for the next three years. Among our priorities are ramping up our collaboration and advocacy with important sectors such as universities and research organisations, NGOs and of course governments, finding new ways to support our members, promoting citizen science activities and opportunities across the nation, and seeking funding to support the functioning of ACSA so we can do more of the above. Professor Hugh Possingham, ACSA's patron, joined us for part of the meeting, shared his learnings from many years of working with NGOs like ACSA and gave us some direction pointers. The Eureka Prizes team is available to provide entry support through until the deadline, so contact them with any questions via eureka@australian.museum.


